Are you Ready?

With 1 month to go, our planning efforts are now in high gear!

If you are able to bring any of the following items, please let us know:

- Masking Tape

Reminders

- If you plan on taking anti-malarial pills, get your prescription filled soon.
- Make sure you have your visa and "yellow card" ready to go, for entry into Ghana.
- If you have not sent in your indemnity form, sign and send it to Joao Aleixo today!

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- Don't forget essentials like shampoo, Pepto Bismal, bug repellent, suntan lotion.
- Non-essentials you might want to consider: power bars, trail mix, peanut butter and crackers, etc.
 There will be plenty of food, but you may need additional variety!

Arrival Information

Upon arrival at Accra airport on August 5th, come to the arrival hall and look for signs welcoming "Yale Alumni Service Corps" and/or Ashanti African Tours.

There are many YASC volunteers on the Delta 420 departing from JFK on August 4th at 5:47PM, arriving into Accra on August 5st at 8:25 AM. Look around for your fellow volunteers and introduce yourself!

Converting Money

You won't need a lot of cash but you should plan on having some for alcoholic drinks at the hotel or for any shopping you plan to do. While US Dollars are often accepted, here are some tips on converting money to the local currency (Ghana Cedis). Bar prices are similar to a mid-level US hotels. Some volunteers choose to leave a modest tip for the hotel maids.

- The exchange rate to US Dollars is approximately 4 Cedis:1 US Dollar (i.e., to convert Cedis to US Dollars, divide by 4)
- You can exchange money at the airport.
- You should be able to withdraw money directly from the ATM at the airport (cards with a Visa logo seem to work better; you should inform your bank in advance).
- Please note-there will be limited opportunity to exchange money once we go to the Cape Coast. We strongly encourage you to do this at the airport.

No tabs will be allowed at the hotel this year - cash only at the bar/restaurant!



Host Families

Small groups of volunteers and families will be matched up with families in Yamoransa who will host you in their home for a short visit. If you've been on a YASC trip to Ghana before and had a host family, please note we will try and match you with the same family, but this is not guaranteed.

Please bring a small gift for your group to give to your host family. Gifts should be simple and under \$10USD in value. Locally themed items (from your region of the US), picture frames, and kitchen items work well as gifts.



Medical Issues

While we can't offer medical advice, but here is a list of tips one of our physicians follows:

- Use bottled water to rinse your toothbrush and when brushing your teeth.
- Avoid ice cubes.
- If you have diarrhea or vomiting, it is critical to stay hydrated. Consider bringing some powdered Gatorade or similar drink mixes (e.g. Ultimate Replenisher or Nuun).
- Don't eat raw vegetables (salads) or fruit unless the fruit can be peeled (e.g. bananas/oranges). We will endeavor to NOT offer these choices, but mistakes may happen so use your common sense.
- Pepto Bismol is the first line treatment for diarrhea or nausea. The CDC even recommends taking it as a preventative measure: <u>http://tinyurl.com/nwj5j68</u>

We can't replace your personal doctors but our medical team can generally be a good source for advice and guidance on the trip. Based on our past experience, if you stick to the bottled water, avoid fresh vegetables and fruits (fruit with a thick skin that gets peeled are okay), and eat the food provided through YASC, most people experience no problems.



Leisure Time

We have some planned trips to local attractions and fun group activities during our down time on the Cape Coast. Here is a preview of what's on tap:

Excursions on Sunday August 7:

Kakum National Park: Walk above treetops on the hanging canopy walkway at Kakum National Park, offering a spectacular, unmatched view of the rainforest. The suspended walkway comprises 1,000 feet of swinging bridge and six tree trunkperched platforms that do not rely on nails or bolts for support.

Elmina and the Slave Castle: Ghana's cost is dotted with castles and fortresses that marked the beginning of a slave's perilous journey during the era of slave trade. We will visit these ancient fortresses and learn about the history of slave trade in the region.

<u>*Please note that you will need to choose one activity above as</u> <u>time will not allow for both.</u>

Evening Activities

The evenings at Coconut Grove represent a wonderful time to unwind and reflect on the day's activities. In addition, we have an array of after dinner programs planned to both educate and entertain.
