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### Yamoransa



You read about Ghana on the website (in the Travel Information section) and now you might be asking, exactly where is Yamoransa? And what is it like?

Yamoransa is at the crossroads of the main road that runs from Accra to Cape Coast and a major road to Kumasi, the second largest city in Ghana. The community straddles the road with most of the residential area being north of the road and one of the schools where we will be working on the south side of the

> road. The sellers of the famous Yamoransa fante kenkey line up along the main road to display and sell their product. To give you an idea of the size and feel of Yamoransa, the main road is the only real paved road in Yamoransa.<sup>4</sup>

There is running water<sup>5</sup> in Yamoransa and there is electricity. There is no medical facility. There are a few schools for children up to 14 years old though there is no high school so older children have to go to other towns to continue their education.

The official language in Ghana is English however the locals often speak the language of their tribe. In Yamoransa, you will often here Fante or Twi which is an Akan language. The children start learning in English by the time they are eight years old so our teachers will be able to work with them – and help them improve. Thanks to AFS and the University of Cape Coast we will have volunteers to help with translation if needed in the medical clinic or for the micro business consulting.

# Partners: AFS and the University of Cape Coast



AFS is an international, voluntary, non-governmental, non-profit organization that provides intercultural learning opportunities to help people develop the knowledge, skills and understanding needed to create a more just and peaceful world. In Ghana, the name is Intercultural Exchange Programs – Ghana.

AFS operates in more than 50 countries, and organizes and supports intercultural learning experiences. Founded by volunteer ambulance drivers following WWII, and sustained to this day by an international cadre of tens of thousands of

volunteers, AFS has transformed the lives of millions of students, families and individuals.

Real life experiential learning, supported by structured reflection, is the core of their programs. AFS endeavors to link intercultural learning opportunities to the defining global issues facing humanity. They reach out to past, current and future participants, volunteers, and other stakeholders using the media and technology available to them.

There are more than 40,000 AFS Volunteers who are active at every level of the organization, from grassroots efforts within the community to policy development roles on national and international boards. Chapters currently operating in Ghana are the Akim Oda, Agona Swedru, Koforidua, Dormaa Ahenkro, Sunyani, Akuapim Mampong, Akwatia, Accra, Ho and Kumasi chapters.

Thanks to an introduction by Alex Asiedu, Yale World Fellow 2008, to Kwame Otchere, Executive Director of AFS Ghana, we are working closely with AFS to bring YASC to Yamoransa. It would be fair to say that we could not do this without the incredible support that Kwame<sup>7</sup> and his staff AND volunteers are bringing to this effort including the introduction to University of Cape Coast. You will have the chance to meet Evans Yeboah, an AFS Ghana volunteer, at our orientation on

#### The University of Cape Coast



The University of Cape Coast is one of the rare sea front universities in the world. It was established in October, 1962 as a University College and placed in a special relationship with the University of Ghana, Legon. On October 1, 1971, by an Act of Parliament, the College attained the status of a full and independent University, with the authority to confer its own degrees, diplomas and certificates.

The University was established out of a dire need for highly qualified and skilled manpower in education to provide leadership and enlightenment. Its original

mandate was therefore to train and graduate professional teachers for Ghana's second cycle institutions and the Ministry of Education, in order to meet the manpower needs of the country's accelerated education program at the time. Today, with the expansion of some of its faculties and the diversification of programs, the University has the capacity to meet the manpower needs of other ministries and industries in the country, besides that of the Ministry of Education.

In the 2008-2009 academic year, 1320 students were admitted to undertake Diploma, undergraduate and post-graduate studies. The number was made up of 941 post-graduate applicants and 379 undergraduate applicants. By gender distribution, 634 of the post-graduate applicants were men and 307 women. For the undergraduate applicants, 233 were men and 146 women.

The Social Sciences Department of UCC introduced us to Yamoransa as they are active in needs assessment work there. There is a PhD student who has written her dissertation about the kenkey women of Yamoransa. Our Business Consulting Group will have a chance to read her report before going to work.

In addition, the Dean of the Medical School has offered to provide some support to our team. If possible, we will have some current medical students work with us in Yamoransa and join us for meals. The Medical School will also do follow up work in specific cases as needed based on the recommendations of our medical team.

## The Projects and the Survey

Yes, it is time to start planning the projects in Yamoransa. We want to make the most of our time in the community – getting to know the people, learning about them, and helping them. We need to arrive with as much of a plan as possible: knowing our teammates, knowing the plan, having the supplies we need. It requires a lot of planning. And we will still need to be flexible and adapt to the situation as we find it when we arrive.

You can read about the Education/Arts/Athletics, Medical, Construction and Business Consulting projects on the website and learn about them from past YASC programs. There are two projects that we are trying to plan which are new to us:

• Y-Apply - Y-Apply was formed in September 2007 when a group of Black Yale alumni came together to develop a workshop centered around the college admissions process for high school students. The first workshop was held in the spring of 2008 at the Yale Club in New York City and met with much success. Y-Apply is in its fifth year of sponsoring the workshop in



New York City and has expanded the workshop to the Washington, D.C. and Chicago metro areas.

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It turns out that there are many high schools in the Cape Coast area with students who could and should apply to college in Ghana and the U.S. but do not know enough about the process. We have been asked by a local entrepreneur to visit some of the girls' schools while we are nearby to encourage them and help them with the college application process.

TV News broadcasting – Talk about media coverage! Kwame has introduced us to Selete and Gifty Nyomi, entrepreneurs in the Cape Coast who have a TV production company. The station broadcasts a few hours a day including interview and news shows. Selete has offered to bring a team to Yamoransa each day to film a segment produced by YASC and the community – especially the teenagers. The team would be responsible for writing the pieces and interviewing program participants as part of the project.

We will also have a community celebration on the last day (August 4). The people of Yamoransa will be performing and showing us how they celebrate. We also want to put on a show for them so the afternoon Arts activities will focus on creating a short performance with song and dance.

Project planning will begin as soon as we have the survey results. The most productive planning opportunity will be our day together in New Haven on April 29<sup>9</sup> although there will be a lot of planning by conference calls and e-mail.
