


Yamoransa, Ghana, August 1 – August 11, 2013

- 159 total volunteers, including:
 - 3 last minute cancellations
 - 3 AYA employees
- Demographics
 - 42 under 18 (i.e. 17 and younger)
 - Youngest: 10, Oldest: 80
 - 75 that provided info on Yale Degree
 - 98 female, 61 male
 - •10 international, 149 US
 - 36% from NY/NJ/CT area, 24% from CA
 - 3 Oxford alums

Number of Volunteers, By Project (not including on-site changes):

- 16 business (2 half day)
- 19 construction (8 full day, rest half day)
- 33 medical (including physical therapy)
- 10 public health
- 78 morning teaching
- 13 ICHA in the afternoon
- 32 afternoon arts
- 21 afternoon athletics



Some Project Highlights

- Business
 - Successful market for all business owners
 - Breadmakers and provision sellers came together
- Construction
 - Flooring completed
 - Most columns for 1st floor erected
 - Forms for cross-beam (for 2nd floor) put in place
 - Plan put in place for drainage, to avoid erosion of foundation
- Medical
 - 900-950 patients, 1050-1100 visits
 - High demand for physical therapy treatment
 - Cooperation with UCCH and more sophisticated lab (equipment donated by QBC) resulted in more adept malaria diagnoses
 - Many more malaria cases



Project Highlights Continued ...

- Public Health
 - Eyeglasses distribution was well accepted
 - UCC Dept. of Optometry was involved
 - Health education classes (for both adult and kids) well attended
 - Surveys
- Education/Arts
 - Lots of positive feedback from our volunteer teachers
 - 25 local teachers involved
 - 13 primary school classes (one joint effort with public health)
 - 8 middle school classes
- Heart Health Project
 - Very high interest among students
 - Sophisticated topics covered, using an activity based approach
 - Every student knew someone who had been affected by a stroke



Project Highlights Continued ...

- Afternoon Arts
 - Fine Arts, Media Arts and Performing Arts
 - Successful exhibition at the end
 - Students in performing arts groups took part in closing ceremony
- Afternoon Athletics
 - 180 students (even split between boys and girls)
 - Boys and Girls activities carried out separately
 - Girls expressed a strong interest in soccer and happy about being given an opportunity to play without being pushed aside by boys
 - Baseball clinic was successful
- College Mentoring
 - Successful partnership with Zawadi Africa for one session
 - Remaining sessions in high schools
 - Strong interest from students who had many basic questions about applying to colleges, including within Ghana



Some Challenges

- Last minute loss of rooms forced relocation of some volunteers
- Flight overbooking resulted in delayed arrivals and a few cancellations

Some Positives

- Advance set-up of medical clinic resulted in a more productive week
- Language activity during orientation was appreciated by volunteers
- Home visits at beginning of trip gave volunteers an opportunity to connect with their "hosts" during the week
- Fewer sick volunteers, as compared to last year
