This inaugural trip includes 53 volunteers of diverse ages and backgrounds, with Yale alumni, their friends and family. We're planning a fun and educational trip as well as a meaningful volunteer experience. Now more than ever, Puerto Rico needs our support.

You may have heard of the earthquakes currently hitting south of the Island. San Juan has experienced minimal disruption but our ground partners at INE and Vamonos Tours continue to monitor the situation. PROJECTS

Most of you have been assigned to your first choice. Team leaders will be reaching out to you very soon. I'm very grateful to the following volunteers who've agreed to serve as team leaders: Ed Weiss '92 MD (Athletics), Santiago Villazon '88, '92 MD (Construction), Judy Crawford '76 (Education) and Rosalia Burke '92 (Public Health). Please respond to their emails. Each team will be responsible for developing their own service program, based on the requests received from our host schools. Team leaders have been advised of current needs but those may continue evolving as we get more details from the schools. Public schools are now closed until 1/22/20 to allow inspections following the recent earthquakes.





TRAVEL

It's time to start booking your flights to Puerto Rico. Luis Muñoz Marín International Airport serves the metro area in San Juan. You're responsible for booking all your airfare and travel arrangements as they are not included in your YASC registration fee. You are expected to arrive Saturday March 7, 2020; the program ends Sunday March 15, 2020. Once you have your flights set, please forward the information to Francheska@vamonostours.com.

The <u>Verdanza Hotel</u> will serve as home base for the week. The hotel is less than 10 minutes from the airport. There are plenty of transportation options to get you there including taxis and Uber. Check in is at 3pm, but if you arrive earlier, the Verdanza can hold your bags and you can use the hotel pool or walk a block to the beach. TRAVEL HEALTH

No specific vaccines or travel advisories are in place for Puerto Rico. Always check with your primary care doctor for particular concerns. I also recommend taking a look at the CDC travel website, full of valuable information. https://wwwnc.cdc.gov/travel/destinations/traveler/none/puerto-rico

TRAVEL WITH A MINOR

As a US territory, all US travel regulations apply.

VISAS

No visas or passports are needed if you're a US citizen. All you need to travel to Puerto Rico from the mainland is a TSA compliant ID. For most of you, this will be your driver's license. Please check with your embassy for entry requirements if you hold a foreign passport.

WEATHER

Puerto Rico has a tropical climate. Expect moderate to high humidity and heat. The sun shines more brightly, so make sure you bring plenty of sunscreen and a hat. San Juan in March sees temperatures ranging from 75°-85°. Rain is common in the tropics. It's not uncommon to experience showers for an hour and then bright sun again.

SIM CARDS

All major US cellphone carriers have either their own network or roaming agreements on the island. Your cellphone should work as if you are on the mainland. You should not be billed for roaming.
